WELCOME

THE TOWN'S NAMESAKE: COLONEL JUAN N. SEGUIN




The town was named for this Tejano patriot, the last messenger from the Alamo. On Sam Houston's orders, he rode to warn the Anglo settlers along the Guadalupe River of Gen. Santa Anna's bold threat to drive them out or kill them, thus setting off the Runaway Scrape which saved countless local citizens who heeded his warning and fled. For this service, Juan Seguin has been called "The Paul Revere of Texas." A statue in Central Park stands in his honor.

The remains of Col. Juan N. Seguin are now buried under a motte of live oaks on a hillside near the Guadalupe County Coliseum.

A state historical marker stands outside City Hall in his honor and the bell from the World War II Liberty ship *Juan N. Seguin* is mounted inside the building above a photo of the ship. Juan Seguin School, the first school in Texas for Hispanics, is located in a now-abandoned building north of Sebastopol House Historic Site and designated with an historical marker. Within city limits, Interstate 10 is designated *Juan Seguin Highway*.

Scenic Drives

Wildflower season begins in late February, peaks in April, and fades into summer. October rains bring a second spring. A good route for viewing is Capote Road - FM 466, passing Capote Baptist Church, El Capote Ranch, and "Old Baldy" in the sand hills. Then left on Hwy 80, left again on Hwy 90-A, right on FM 1150 to pass through Darst Oil Field. Left on FM 1104 to I-10 or Hwy 90.

HISTORIC SITES/MUSEUMS

DOWNTOWN HISTORIC DISTRICT: A MAIN STREET CITY

Explore a museum, gift shops, retailers, cafés, a saloon, and live music venues in early 20th century brick-fronted buildings. Period street lamps recall a genteel era.



Central Park
Be captivated by a restored 1930s fountain with dancing waters and changing multi-colored lights. The bronze statue of

Juan Seguin by Eric Christianson and granite historical markers ornament the square. A bandstand evokes days of old with performances of Sousa marches, country picking and romantic serenades.

Notable Architecture

Note how the limestone of the Art Moderne style City Hall and Courthouse recalls the city’s earlier glory of concrete structures.

Courthouse Square

Corner of Austin St. and Court St.

Grab a photo at the Texas-sized Pecan on the Courthouse grounds. The “pecan-crete” icon honors a major industry here. Crops of up to three million pounds make this county one of the nation’s leading producers. Nearby a Veterans Memorial recognizes the local men and women who proudly served in the Armed Forces.



Old Stagecoach Route - Donegan St. at Travis St.
Trace the stagecoach route from its overnight stop at the Magnolia Hotel

through the town square past a panoramic mural by Brent McCarthy that recreates the landmarks along the way. Continue through the fieldstone walls of beautiful Walnut Springs Park.

Los Nogales
Puzzle over who built this remarkable house for a German pioneer in 1849 when hundreds of slaves lived in this county. The adobe bricks are like those used in W. Africa and Mexico.

Texas’ Oldest Standing Protestant Church

This frontier structure, now more than 160 years old, was finished in time to host the 1849 Conference of Texas Methodists. The charming building is perfect for small weddings and meetings. See True Women Tours.

Campbell-Hoermann Log Cabin

John Campbell, an immigrant from Ireland, built a one-room cabin that he later enlarged for his 23 family members when they came to Texas in 1850. It was still occupied by members of the same family more than 100 years later.



Calaboose

Reflect on a wheeled jailhouse used to carry prisoners to work on county roads or in private fields to chop weeds and pick cotton.



Dietz Doll House
Peek inside the windows of this charming 1910 Victorian doll house built by German-born master cabinetmaker Louis Dietz for adopted daughter Alice.

Explore this Greek Revival architectural limecrete wonder, built in 1856 by skilled slaves. Discover the mystery dungeon and the secret of how the living quarters were “cooled” during hot

Texas summers. Sebastopol is one of the finest surviving 19th-century concrete buildings in the U.S. Once “The Mother of Concrete Cities” Seguin boasted nearly 100 buildings made from limecrete. Less than 20 of these relics still stand and can be seen on the “Limecrete Architecture” self-guided tour. Also, view the **Wilson Pottery** exhibits of historic pottery, artifacts and memorabilia from the first business in Texas operated by freed slaves. Celebrate Texas’ independence at the annual event “Toast to Texas” on March 2.



The Moore House

This Queen Anne home was built more than a century ago by one of Teddy Roosevelt’s hunting partners in the same style as Roosevelt’s famous estate, Sagamore Hill. The owner provided quarter horses to Roosevelt from nearby El Capote Ranch. The future President rode to fame on one of them at the Battle of San Juan Hill in Cuba during the Spanish-American War.



The Stephen and Mary Birch Texas Theatre

Enjoy live musical concerts and live theater such as “Steel Magnolias” and “12 Angry Men” at the exuberant Spanish-Colonial-style restored theater which opened during Seguin’s 1930s oil boom. The original TEXAS sign, a fine survivor of this popular pre-neon type, uses hundreds of individual bulbs.



Seguin Heritage Museum

Enjoy the rich multi-ethnic heritage and contributions throughout the centuries of Seguin and Guadalupe County. View a collection of Native American artifacts discovered south of downtown and view a photographic record of days gone by from the famed Leon’s Studio, all located in an 1898 building of locally-made bricks with original loblolly and long-leaf pine floors, once occupied by the Baenziger Red and White grocery store.

Pick up delicious local nuts and other gifts and souvenirs. Tour guide and refreshments provided for group tours.

True Women Tours

Relive history as women experienced it, as told in *True Women*. This best-selling novel by Seguin native Janice Woods Windle became a mini-series starring Angelina Jolie, Dana Delaney and Annabeth Gish. Begun as a family cookbook to give to a son and his bride, it grew into an “epic tale of war and adventure, love and murder, violence and redemption.” Family lore continues in her novels *Hill Country* and *Will’s War*. Self-drive map of historic locales and step-on guides available for group tours.

“There’s a Ghost Story Here” Tours
Take a guided walking tour through Seguin’s haunted Victorian past. Visit sites in the historic district investigated by paranormal groups and hear ghostly stories. During Pecan Fest Heritage Days the last weekend in October or call for a private group tour.




Historic Cemetery Tours
Held at Riverside Cemetery in late October, “Our Ancestors Speak” includes re-enactments of notable citizens from Seguin’s past. Co-sponsored by the Affiliation for the Preservation of Shakespeare and Federated Women’s Clubs.

Group Tours
Bring your bus-load of folks to Seguin to discover the history and charm of one of the oldest settlements in Texas. Visit the wondrous “limecrete” Sebastopol House, the Heritage Museum and Village, Pape’s Pecan House Nutcracker Museum, and drive by beautiful Victorian homes, Central Park, and downtown historic buildings. We’ll build your itinerary and make arrangements for lunch, shopping and a step-on tour guide.

RECREATION

Max Starcke Park

Explore an exceptional public park designed by Robert H.H. Hugman, landscape architect of the River Walk in San Antonio. Meander along scenic River Drive where the Guadalupe’s jade-green waters reflect towering cypress trees. See waterfalls cascade over the dam at the historic Troell hydroelectric plant. Get active with golf, volleyball, basketball, tennis, softball, and kayaking. Relax at pavilions and picnic areas, or enjoy a hike-and-bike path along the river. Let them loose at the **Kids Kingdom Playscape**, a shaded playground. Let your dogs run free at the new, and spacious, fenced-in **Barky Park**.

Seguin is one of the oldest towns in Texas

In 1838, just two years after the victory at San Jacinto, a group of Texas Rangers organized a settlement. They chose a site among live oaks above springs that fed the Guadalupe River. The town was named for Juan Seguin, a Tejano patriot.

Settlers arrived from the Old South, bringing many African slaves. Later, thousands of German immigrants came to the area, as well as folks from Switzerland, Poland, Austria and France.

For a century, the town’s prosperity came from the surrounding farms and pastures. In 1930, the nearby Darst Field set off an oil boom. In the past half century, new manufacturing jobs have attracted many newcomers to this growing community.


